1. Introduction

Infection prevention and control (IPC) is an important component of any programme or initiative that improves the quality of patients' care, the occupational health of staff and the safety of visitors to healthcare premises. It is the intention of the infection prevention and control team working within Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (CWP) to promote the prevention and control of infection within all healthcare facilities and all healthcare provision.

2. Policy statement

IPC is an important part of an effective risk management programme to maintain, and where possible improve the quality of patients' care, the occupational health of staff and the safety of visitors. In addition to the need to prevent avoidable infections, there are also legal requirements that must be met which ensure the appropriate steps to protect patients, staff and visitors from avoidable harm are taken.

To protect patients and staff CWP has in place an IPC work programme and assurance framework which reflect the standards set out within the Health and Social Care Act (2015). Moreover, the programme and framework provide the basis for which CWP will implement and monitor standards to provide assurance regarding IPC policy and practice to the Board of Directors.

It is the intention of the CWP IPC team to promote the prevention and control of infections and act as a resource for both staff and the general public within all healthcare facilities and all care provision.

In order to achieve this CWP will implement an effective infection prevention and control operational policy which aims to reduce risks and any potential harm to CWP patients, employees and visitors. This policy should be read in conjunction with all relevant health and safety and supporting IPC policies.

The work of the CWP IPC team is supported by the Countess of Chester's microbiology team.

3. Scope

Implementing the control of infection measures applies to all CWP patients, employees both permanent and temporary and visitors and forms part of CWP's approach to health and safety.

4. Aim

The aim of this policy is to ensure a cultural shift towards the control of infection within CWP and commits CWP to ensuring that there is an effective overarching IPC strategy in place.

The overarching strategy will ensure an effective IPC programme with defined objectives that will guide regular reviews of IPC policy and practice. The aim being to create opportunities for managerial or leadership action that will assist the implementation of this programme and ensure services are complaint with the Health and Social Care Act (2015).

5 Reporting to Public Health England

CWP will ensure that it complies with directives from the Department of Health (DH) with regards to reporting Healthcare Associated Infections (HCAI) to PHE and or CQC where appropriate.

6. Monitoring

The IPC work programme, which includes the assurance framework for infection prevention and control and HCAI, will be reviewed during the quarterly Infection Prevention and Control Sub – Committees. The work programme / assurance framework is available via the IPCT intranet page.
