When will I be able to return to school/work?

You can return to school/work the day after surgery, but if you wear closed-in shoes or boots pressure may delay the healing. However, if you have to wear closed in shoes take them off whenever you can. If you stand or walk for long periods of time the clot could be disturbed and the wound may bleed again.

On the day of your nail surgery:

- 1. Bring a list of your current medication
- 2. If you use and inhaler or spray please bring it with you
- 3. Take all prescribed medicine as usual unless told otherwise
- 4. Eat normally prior to your appointment
- 5. Remove all nail polish from your nails
- Bring footwear that will accommodate a dressing e.g. sandals, slippers etc.
- Bring a book or listen to music through your headphones if you prefer to be occupied during the procedure
- 8. Do not drive until the local anaesthetic has worn off (between 2 and 4 hours)

What is nail surgery?

It is minor surgery on toenails and the nail growing area (nail bed).

Why do I need nail surgery?

When the edge of the nail digs into the skin the area becomes red, swollen and painful. This is called an ingrowing toenail and the nail edge can break the skin letting bacteria into the area causing an infection. The piece of nail that is digging in needs to be removed for the skin to heal and return to normal.

What are the benefits of nail surgery?

The surgery will correct the ingrowing toenail and prevent recurrence. It is successful in 95% of people.

What are the risks of nail surgery?

These depend on your general health and how you look after your toe after the surgery but delayed healing, infection and a reaction to the anaesthetic, which is very rare, can occur.

The podiatrist will fully explain the benefits and risks of surgery before hand so that you can make an informed decision about your choice of treatment.

Do I really need nail surgery?

If your toenail is ingrowing it is unlikely to heal by itself. If your toenail is just thickened or deformed, nail surgery will reduce the pain and discomfort you are feeling.

Before the procedure

On the day of the nail assessment you may be offered nail surgery immediately so you should wear either a shoe with the toe cut away or a toe-less sandal. This will allow room for the dressing.

We recommend you don't drive immediately after the procedure as your toe will be numb. It is a good idea to arrange for someone to collect you or book yourself a taxi.

The Procedure

You will be asked to lie down throughout the procedure. The ingrowing toenail will be removed using local anaesthetic which is injected into the base of the toe. You will be awake during the procedure but will feel no pain. When the nail or the offending piece of nail is removed, the nail bed is treated with a chemical to stop it from growing back. The toe is then cleaned and a dressing put on.

What will my toe look like afterwards?

If the edge of the nail is removed, the nail will look similar to how it looked before treatment but it will be narrower. During the healing process you may lose the whole nail but it will grow back. The nail may split or become ridged but this should settle and grow out in time. We cannot guarantee the cosmetic appearance of the nail after surgery. If the whole nail has been removed, the nail bed will just be a flat area of skin.

After the surgery

You are advised to rest with your feet up, preferably sitting with your legs raised higher then your hips, but feel free to take occasional short walks indoors to keep your circulation going.

Do not remove your dressings. Sometimes you will see some blood through the dressing. This is quite normal; if this happens cover the dressing with another layer of gauze. It is important to keep your dressing dry.

You should avoid all sports especially swimming.

Will the operation hurt?

No, the local anaesthetic we use for the operation will keep your toe numb for between 2 and 4 hours.

If you need too, take pain killers (according to the manufacturer's instructions) but avoid taking aspirin as this may cause the toe to bleed again. Keep the foot elevated whenever possible.

Will I have appointments after my surgery?

In most cases yes, we will remove the large post-operative dressing, clean the toe and redress the wound. We will also advise you how to cleanse your toe, use salt water footbaths and re-dress your toe(s) yourself. You should continue to wear your sandals.
